Some stamped handles from the Dipylon excavations of 1962

(Thasian material in Gurlin's Part 2. See also group)

A group of 7 stamped amphora handles, and one unstamped, plus the foot of an amphora, were shown to me at the Kerameikos in late October 1962 for an opinion, as of some interest for dates at the Dipylon. The case was marked: "Dipylon 62 unter Strasse II B." I said the fragments seemed third to last quarter of the 4th century. The group and its date are of importance to my studies. I expand here somewhat on my comment to Dr. Vierneisel. First analysis of the material, with publication references for parallels for the stamp types.

A stamp of ΘΑΞΜΑΧΟΞ, SS 1160, was found in Thompson's Hellenistic Group A, which Thompson in 1934 dated about 300 B.C.; I believe that G.R.Edwards is now inclined to place the filling slightly earlier. An amphora of ΘΑΞΜΑΧΟΞ, SS 14261, bearing a stamp like Bon no. 1600, was found in 1957 in the construction filling of a well, Agora F 17 : 3, probably datable in the third quarter of the 4th century.

The top of a jar of ΑΡΙΣΤΟΘΑΝΗΞ, SS 14096, with stamp like Bon 406 (the device a mask, cf. GA 1773) was found in the filling of a pit (A 17 : 3) dated recently

(1960) by Edwards last quarter of 4th to about 290 B.C. Another handle of APIETOΘANHΣ, SS 14437, was found in 1960 in the construction filling of the peristyle of the Heliada, dated by Thompson ^{Thompson} him third quarter of the 4th century; the stamp type is Bon, no.386, of which GA 1771 is probably an example. The rim sections preserved on SS 14437 and 14096 show that the latter comes from an amphora of somewhat later period than the former; the activity of APIETOΘANHΣ seem to have extended from the third to the last quarters of the century.

We have no previous context for KPINOMENHΣ, but the style of his stamps and the devices used had seemed to place him in the latter 4th century.

Note that a style of the second half of the 4th century in Thasian stamps is to have the name and ethnic written along the short sides of the rectangle, of Hesperia Suppl.X, p.137, the heading for numbers 57 and 58, and these numbers on plate 58; this is not the only style of the period, but it is one which apparently does not reappear later. Note that 57 above-cited comes from the construction debris of the Athenian City Wall of the late 4th century B.C. Of your six Thasian stamps, 1769 and 1772, and probably also 1774, are done in this style.

Your Rhodian GA 1775 ⁷¹⁶ might be called proto-Rhodian, as belonging to a period before the later characteristic style of the Rhodian amphora had been settled upon. Of the same period is the Pnyx example, Hesperia Suppl.X, p.141, no.70, from the packing of the City Wall of the late 4th century (like 57, see above). These proto-Rhodian amphoras came in three contemporary shapes, of which few illustrations have been published; for the best and most recent, see E. Vanderpool and others, Hesperia 1962, pl.19, fig.5, and pl.22, fig.27.

I believe now that this gattung dates mainly from the last quarter of the 4th century, possibly beginning slightly earlier, perhaps not replaced by "normal" Rhodian until a few years past 300 B.C. But I have little context to cite in support of this belief beyond that of the Pnyx example from the packing of the City Wall.

Dr. Vierneisel mentioned I think that with the Dipylon 1962 group had been found a bronze Athenian coin dated 297-255 B.C. If this is a date assigned by Svoronos in Tresors (1923-1926), is it perhaps to be revised upwards? Cf. J. P. Shear, Hesperia 1933, pp.246 ff. Mrs. Shear's revisions seem to have been accepted in some quarters at any rate: see Hesperia 1962, p. 39, under no. 56, a coin found in one of the buildings on the Koroni peninsula; in this case, the Svoronos dating would be I think 255-229 B.C., too late for the Chremonidean War of 265-261 B.C., the period to which the excavators now attribute the buildings found.

I should perhaps remark that the dates of Thompson's Group A and other ^{of} Agora deposit groups assigned above (pp.1-2) to the latter 4th century have not been reconciled to a Chremonidean date for the Koroni finds, for which the parallels cited in Thompson Groups (except in one case, under the unguentarium no. 42) are in fact with Group A.

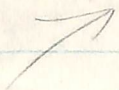

See p. 3 of the Analysis of this group dated 11.I.71, Garlan's comments on the pottery (not much of it, and not distinguishably later than Olynthos, 348 B.C.) and on the stamps (all of the "recent" class, but among the earliest of the "recent").

Comparison with Thasian found in Alexandria, founded in 331: we have made an analysis of this latter, and just as well, since we found things not fully in order and on file. I find that of some 58 types in the Lower Group, only 6 appear in Alexandria: 1) ΑΑΚΙΜΟΣ with vase IX (Bon 181), 2) ΔΕΙΝΩΠΙΑΣ with vase II (Bon 560), 3) ΚΑΕΟΦΩΝ with thyrsos (Bon 980, part), 4) ΚΑΕΟΦΩΝ with vase I (Bon 986), 5) ΚΑΕΟΦΩΝ with wheel (post-Bon type), 6) ΠΟΛΥΝΕΙΚΗΣ with gamma (Bon 1359). But of 19 names in the Lower Group, all but 3 appear also in Alexandria, the missing names being ΚΡΑΤΙΣΤΩΝΑΣ, ΔΕΩΔΙΚ(, and ΠΑΜΦΑΗΣ. In addition to missing names, there are 3 names with only one example each in Alexandria which are comparatively common in the Lower Group. Assuming that the Recent class began in or about 340 B.C., and that the letters with ΠΟΛΥΝΕΙΚΗΣ mark years, a type with Π should be dated ca. 324 B.C., bringing the Lower Group to at least so late. If AVG₁ was really found in Alexandria (and not just brought to the museum where the stamps are), then it was a little aged ^{even if} ~~when~~ the amphora was brought at the time of the foundation in 331, since Γ should date in 338.

Possibly the types of ΑΛΚΙΜΟΣ, ΑΡΙΣΤΟΦΑΝΗΣ, and ΠΑΜΦΑΗΣ are datable on the whole earlier than 331; on the other hand, ^{the produce of} these fabricants (?) may simply not have been exported to Alexandria. The 3 examples of ΗΡΑΚΛΕΙΤΟΣ with bow and quiver in the Lower Group contrasted with none of these in Alexandria but an example of the same fabricant with bow and arrow (AVG 1236) may suggest that the latter device-combin-

 ation was ^{later} with this fabricant; various pieces of evidence place him soon after 340 B.C.

The great number of different devices (over 40, see the attached concordance of the Lower Group by device) is in accordance with the notion that at this date the potters changed their devices every year, and did not agree on a common device, as a rule at any rate. ΠΟΛΥΝΕΙΚΗΣ chose to number his years with letters, which are known down to omega (though mu, phi, chi and psi have not been found; we do have koppa and sampi); the letters are known in variations which suggest that the year was divided. In the same way, the very numerous known types of ΚΑΕΟΘΩΝ are known in variations, mostly done by changing the relative position of the device (top right or left, etc.).

As to Garlan's evidence for dating apart from the dates of the small finds and pottery, he notes (pp. 586-7) that a ΠΥΘΙΝΙΟΣ ΠΑΙΣΤΡΑΤΟΣ was a theoros in 315-285 B.C., and suggests [⊗] that this man was the grandson of the ΠΥΘΙΝΙΟΣ ΠΑΙ who restored the gate in a monumental program, and whose name is written on the Doric architrave. This bldg. program is related by Garlan to the stratification that he found. However, the grandfather of somebody datable as theoros in 315-285 B.C. ought apparently to have been flourishing 60 years before, or 375-345 B.C., which would be too early for the stamps as they contain no 2-name types. We do not find that Garlan decides for a particular date, or even whether the man on the architrave could be the theoros whose date is called 315-285 B.C.

For the description of the excavations at the Porte de Zeus in the city wall of Thasos, see B.C.H.XC, 1966, pp.586 ff. The source of the "lower group" at this gate is the "couche inferieure", i.e. below Couche 7 in fig.1 on p. 587, i.e. essentially Couche 9. C. 7 was of marble chips, and above it, essentially C. 4, was the source of the "upper group" at the same gate. Apparently (cf. p. 588) C. 9 was laid in to fill a stream bed when the course of the stream was altered. The non-stamp contents of C. 9, such as they were, Y.G. considers as not distinguishably later than Olynthos, see his pp. 589-590, The stamps however all belong to the "recent" class, i.e. with one name (his p.592, note 1, on "la distinction stylistique, a valeur chronologique", with ref.s). On pp. 592-3 he lists some evidence (from us, though he does not make this clear), which indicates that the types in C.9 are among the first of the one-name types: 1) in some, the legend tends to surround the device [cf. Pnyx, p.136, heading for no.56] or occupies the two short sides of the stamp [ibid., p. 137, for nos. 57-58]; 2) for a number of names there is context evidence attributing them to the third or last quarter of the 4th century, i.e. for ΑΡΙΣΤΟΘΑ-ΝΗΣ; ΔΕΙΝΩΡΙΑΣ, ΗΡΑΚΛΕΙΤΟΣ, ΚΛΕΟΦΩΝ (3 contexts), ΚΡΙΝΟΜΕΝΗΣ, ΠΟΥΛΥΣ, ΘΗΛΕΜΑΧΟΣ. (Context information, including references, all comes from us ultimately, and much directly.

There seem to be no lunate sigmas in this group.

On the deposit, see attached letter of 14.XII.70 from K. Butt, with quotation from HSR's notebook, after sorting of pottery, April, 1961, calling this a dumped filling of the early 3rd century B.C. containing much earlier material; the various levels of the fill, B, C, D, E, probably without chron. significance. His notice in Hesperia 31, 1962, p.125, gives the same date. G.R.E.'s comment, in August 12, 1965, i.e. in a typed list of that date in his longhand, described this "abandonment fill" as having been dumped in the second quarter of the 3rd century (but including 7th, 6th, much 5th, much 4th, as well as a "generous supply of early Hellenistic"); he sees the Use Fill (with no SAH) as going down to 275 B.C.

On the SAH: typescript VG to GRE, also dated August 12, 1965, remarks that 265 (⊕I) and 266 (K) have fair parallels in the Isthmia South Slope cistern, lower earth, thought by me to ~~have~~ be latter 4th cf. Hesperia 1963, p.321, note 7. In that typescript, I suggested a date of the second half of the 4th century for the Thasian KPATIETONAE. There is further evidence putting him there in Garlan's stratified deposits in Thasos, where K. appears in the lower as well

as the upper layer at the Gate of Zeus, see B.C.H. 1966, p. 626 for relevant part of catalog of the lower earth, and p. 638 for relevant part of catalogue of upper earth. The actual type of C 60-275 is present in the upper earth, see under no.146 where our 275 is cited as restoring the reading of the Thasos example. Possibly it is one of K.'s later types. Date of Garlan's upper earth: see p. 595, top, potters active in the last quarter of the 4th century and the beginning of the 3rd. C 60-265 and 266 mentioned above are of the Corinthian B class. It is clear that this class was stamped as early as the 4th century B.C. but there are not many well-dated pieces; recently one from the Kerameikos (KGA 2159) comes from a filling which "should be Before 338 B.C." (Fradlein Knigge).

(The stamps being largely single letters, or otherwise simple, we have not succeeded in discovering connections ^{within} ~~in~~ the series, which would help to establish the chronology.)

The Parian (??) C 60-274 is what instigated this investigation: a papallel (not from the same die) ^{, SS 14501,} would help to date one of W. Graham's houses; the filling seems to be called E 29 : 4. ^(x) W.G. would like to pull its finding-place down past 300 B.C. so as to leave adequate time for the renovations that can be seen to have taken place in that house.

The stamps do not actually require a date after 300 B.C., according to present information on them; neither do they exclude it.

Of the stamps of Chersonesos found at the Agora, those listed here are three out of a total five. One of the remaining two is a duplicate of SS 11485 of the present deposit, SS 8929 from ΔΔ underground drain at west end of section, datable about 300(?). These four ~~may all be attributable~~ ^{may all be attributable} ~~apparently~~ to Akhmerov's Group I of this class, which he dates 320-250 B.C.: the name ΕΑΝΘΟΣ appears only in this group, the name ΗΡΑΚΛΕΙΟΣ in this as well as in the other three. (The other handle at the Agora, SS 9171, names an astynomos listed by Akh. in his Group IV (180-100 BC), and its context - NN, Great Drain South - thus supports Akh.'s chronology.)

For the Thasian, there is not much independent context evidence for these names: at Thasos, accompanying pottery suggested a date of before 300 for ΑΡΙΣΤΟΑΙΚΟΣ; at Doura, the top of a jar of ΗΡΗΜΗΘΑΙΣ was found under a floor laid between 300 and 250

B.C.; there is nothing useful at the Agora except this deposit. (The MSBF, which has some Thasian earlier than these, does not contain stamps of any of these persons, probably - only one of a different ΑΙΞΠΩΝ, and three of one or two different men named ΠΥΘΙΩΝ, according to arrangement of stamps, and fabric.) Their fabric helps to set off this group: no rims are preserved on these particular handles, ^{but} on other handles ~~of~~ with these persons named occurs ^{rather fat} the rolled rim which follows the earlier angular profile (cf. Pnyx, p.124), and is itself replaced in the third century by something ^{much smaller} ~~of much less projection~~. (Fat rolled rim known with ΑΡΙΣΤΕΙΑΗΣ, ΠΡΗΕ-ΙΠΟΑΙΣ, and ΠΥΘΙΩΝ III and IV.) Several of these handles here listed are ^{unusually} ~~particularly~~ broad and thin, cf. particularly those of ΑΡΙΣΤΕΙΑΗΣ, ΚΗΦΙΣΤΩΦΩΝ with kreagra, ΝΙΚΟΔΗΜΟΣ with herm. Not only the rims, but usually also the upper attachments of handles, ^{are} ~~is~~ missing, and probably most had relatively long upper parts, as on the handle of ΑΙΞΠΩΝ, Thasos 2212, preserved with both attachments, no rim. (Some of the less broad handles may have come from jars of less than unit size, cf. the larger and smaller jars from Pontamo, Rhodes VG 125 and 126, probably of about this period.)

In estimating the date of this group of Thasian, must observe that ^{it} is clearly a stage later than that from the construction filling of the Squ. Bldg. (according to shape, and character of stamp, and the way the stamp is set on the handle), and that it is my belief that the construction filling lot are datable later than 340 B.C., according to the type of stamp (cf. Pnyx, p.123.). This ^{ostr. filling} lot belong to the period still of the angular rim, one of which is preserved on SS 11003, while the others, as remarked, probably had ~~fattish~~ rolled rims. In the two groups, the whole jars probably looked respectively like SS 14261 (jar of ΘΑΕΜΑΧΟΣ, from F 17 : 3) and SS 10340 (jar of ΚΑΕΟΩΩΝ, from D 16 : 1); however, SS 10340 does not have broad handles. *(over fat rim)*

For the group with stamps having letters in a ^{or cut in 3} quartered circle, which may be from Thasos (Bon nos. 2146 ff.), there seems to be no better ^{direct} evidence on date than the present deposit, but similar types occur on coins apparently of the mid-4th century (cf. Staerman, "Pottery Stamps of Tyras", p.46).

No more chronological evidence for the remaining handles of our group.

From notes taken by me on the sherds in April 1952: included were unstamped Thasian handles, some with fat rolled rim, some with a smaller, thinner rim, like that on SS 10340; also a toe of the offset kind like that on SS 14261, but the offset end is longer (0.055 instead of ca. 0.035 as on SS 14261; cf. also Bon, p.20, fig. 4, no.1, jar in Thasos, no stamp preserved).

Also included: among Chian unstamped fragments, a rim-and-handle piece, and part of a deeply pierced toe, both thought to be of the last quarter of the fourth ~~century~~ century; a couple of bits apparently of Coan jars; ~~xxxxxxxx~~ rim-and-handle fragments which present information suggests may be Rhodian, ~~xxxxxxxxxxxx~~ of the three latter-4th century Rhodian jar types. Other classes are identifiable.

The lack of normal Rhodian is in keeping with a date before 300 B.C.

In Calvet 1972, the above publication numbers are listed on p. 3 as those of stamped handles that were found in a sondage at K IV 2/8 10 and 8 10, along with lamps. E. calls the date "end of 4th and beginning of 3rd cut" (in French). However, the Rhodian Ἀκείως date an amphora in Rhodes in the time of Νόσωνος, probably no earlier than the 2/4 of 3rd.

Less fixed are monograms, but ^{of} this kind of stamp, with monograms in relief with, one has been found in Southeyoke, suggesting a date between 359 and 229 B.C. (see Gray 1955, p. 20).

The two Thessian are not in Q 10:1, but have been found in some fair deposits suggesting late 4th - early 3rd. In Gabel's table (BC# Suppl. 13) they are in the group C, in which he put the "later part" of Q 10:1 (with II 0:1a & IV instead of II. III) — and also the Koroni 3, whose seam & date ca 270.

In the foregoing list, where no date appears, the date is that of the preceding item, e.g., the last ten items on p. 2 were all found on 23.III.56 according to notebook and/or locations given on inventory cards.

The fragments called "Corinthian" in the lists derive from amphoras like e.g. IP 1437, or Corinth 40-404 (see Hesperia 1948, p.233, E 13; 4th century B.C.). The clay is coarse, full of large bits. Cf fabric of Corinthian tiles and mortars, also, I believe t.c. sculpture. The surface of the amphoras is rough.

"Coreycean" fragments come from jars of quite different shape and clay. For large fragments from Isthmia, of IP 582 and 584 which may be top and bottom of the same jar; also, I think, IP 878, whole jar, but owing to the piled-up sherd trays, I could not really see it on my visit of VIII.58. The fine clay of this series, especially when fired pale (sometimes greenish) buff, also suggests a possible Corinthian source. Coreyra however may also be suggested as the provenance, partly because of the coin type here represented on IP 728; see further Hesperia 1953, p. 109, upper left paragraph. A lot of jars of this class have been found in the sea off the west coast of Greece. (Now in the Patras museum.)

A noticeable characteristic of the "Coreycean" fragments, in addition to the peculiar rim which is recognizable when any ^{trace} part of it is preserved, is the fact that the stamp often appears on or near the lower attachment of the handle instead of on top. The rather soft pale buff clay above-mentioned also makes the earlier handles of this class easy to distinguish, but before the end of the 4th century the clay, still fine, is fired hard and red.

Date of the cistern, according to the SAH: Note in the lists that the upper earth produced 6 handles (2 Thasian and 4 Rhodian) datable in the 1st half of the 3rd cent. BC, the latest being perhaps IP 704, about the middle of the 3rd cent. I don't know whether there was a stratigraphic change at the level where the "vertical trench" was started, but certainly no SAH known to be as late as the 3rd cent. appeared in the lower earth (either in the sample taken out in XI.55, or in the larger remainder cleared in III.56). There is here a marked difference from the upper earth in the proportion of foreign to local (or Empire) production, and the only independently dated items in the lower earth are of the second half of the 4th cent.

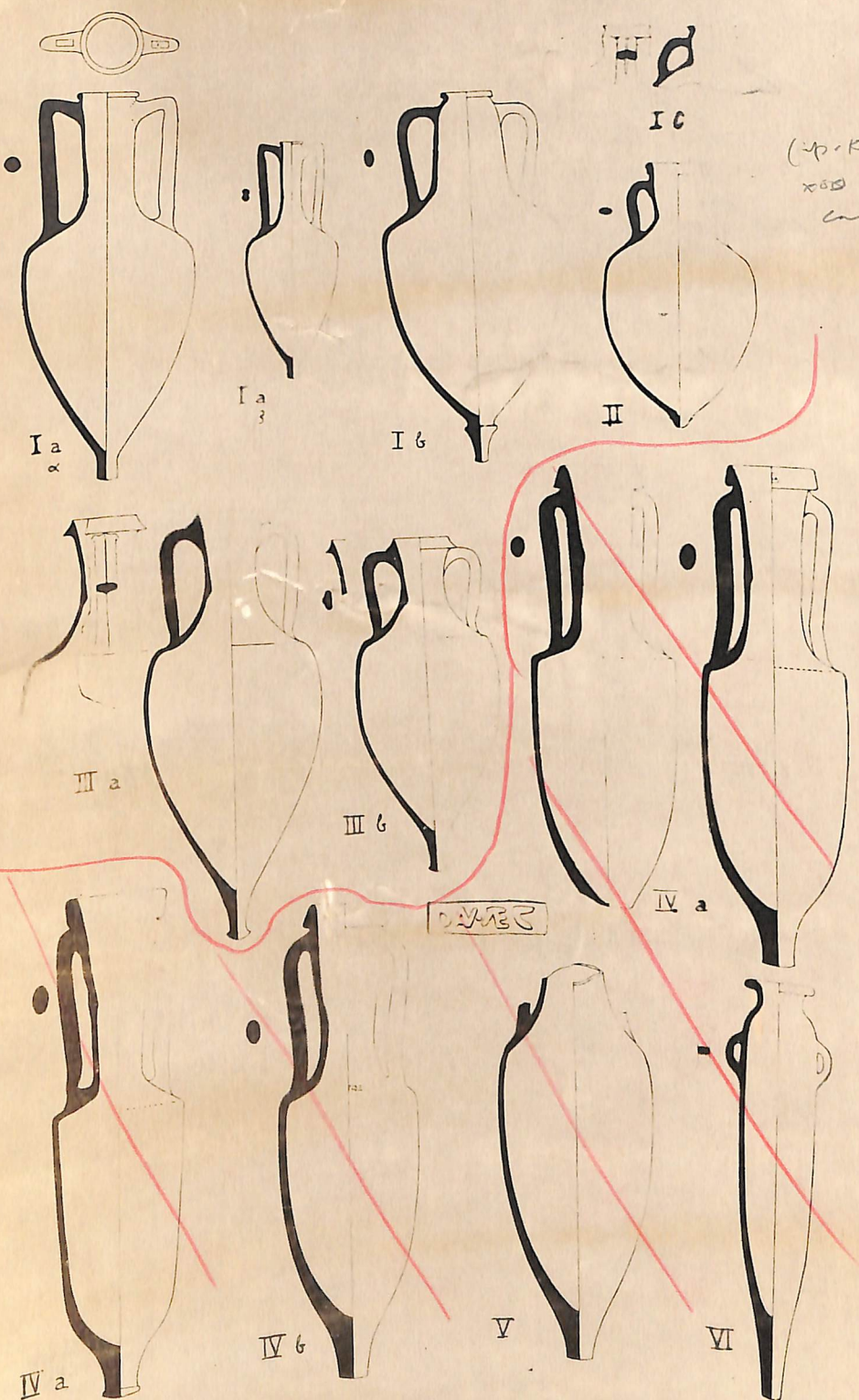


Fig. 2. — Types d'amphores. — I a, α : Rhodes, grand modèle, h. : 0m,80. — I a, β : Rhodes, petit modèle, h. : 0m,50 (cf. fig. 3). — I b : Cnide, h. : 0m,79 (cf. fig. 4). — I c : col' de type inédit. — II : grecque, en forme de toupie, h. : 0m,65. — III a : gréco-italique, grand modèle, h. : 0m,88-90. — III b : gréco-italique, petit modèle, h. : 0m,63. — IV a : romaine, de SES., h. : 1m,02 (cf. fig. 5 et 6). — IV b : romaine, de h. : 0m,98 (cf. fig. 7). — V : romaine, à profil fuselé, h. sans le col : 0m,83. — VI : punique, h. : 0m,82.

Order is alphabetical, eponyms and fabricants together. Pairs of stamps on handles that are actually joined (necks, etc.) are repeated in the list for the second name to take its alphabetical place. Non-joining pairs have been filled in in parentheses: SS 92 which names ΣΩΔΑΜΟΣ with month ΑΡΤΑΜΙΤΙΟΣ is certainly from a jar of ΣΩΚΡΑΤΗΣ as we have the same dies on the whole amphora of this fabricant, Gordion SS 40; SS 88 which names the same ep. with a different month is very probably of the same fab. as the style of the stamp is very

close to that of SS 92. The unread stamp SS 87 is almost certainly a type of ΑΓΟΠΑΝΑΕ and may be the companion stamp on the other handle of SS 23; when I find its photo, it may be possible to restore the reading, with present facilities.

All these stamps are rectangular, save SS 27, circular with rose, name not read.

Note there are 16 numbered items, of which 3 (SS 21, 22, and 94) are joined pairs with a single inventory number, so the total of stamped handles comes to 19.

Blue dates (so-called because they have been entered in blue in many places in our files here): these are according to the tentative sequence worked out, in and after 1971, for the middle period of Rhodian eponyms; the sequence brings the end date of HAT Group B down to ca. 241 B.C. (instead of ca. 275 B.C. as originally suggested), and the Koroni Rhodian eponyms down to the decade 280-270 B.C.

Note that eponyms named individual years, but fabricants naturally functioned over a period of years. Comprehensive dates given here for their operations are not exclusive of earlier or later activity, within reason, of a particular fabricant; they are simply the dates (Blue ~~Rix~~ Dates) of the earliest and latest eponyms coupled with that fabricant in pairs that we happen to have, whether from the preservation of a whole amphora or amphora-top, or by virtue of a respectable guess (based on analogies, etc.). So the dates we have for ΦΙΑΑΙΝΙΟΞ need not pull our group down below 207, the year attributed to ΣΡΑΑΜΟΞ. In that case, possibly SS 25, with ep. ΣΡΑΑΜΟΞ and month ΒΑΑΡΟΜΙΟΞ, was the companion handle to SS 89 of ΦΙΑΑΙΝΙΟΞ. (The dating of this fabricant is difficult because there is great variation in the types with his name; it is not sure that all are of the same ΦΙΑΑΙΝΙΟΞ, although the handles seem to be pretty close in date.)

For one fabricant, no date has been entered, since we have no pairs with a ΜΒΝΩΝ using stamps of just this type; in other types, the name is known in pairs with Blue Dates between 222 and 217.

The group then dates in the last quarter of the 3rd century, and apparently one could narrow the date further, with fair credibility.
